About this Learning Opportunity

Critical thinking is not new - educators around the world recognize critical thinking as an important competency for all students to develop.

Alberta Education has identified critical thinking as one of the eight competencies listed in the Ministerial Order on Student Learning. But, how can teachers effectively engage students in critical thinking within Alberta's Programs of Study?

This interactive session will begin by defining critical thinking and reflecting on our perceptions related to this competency. Through interactive discussions and protocols, you will deepen your understanding of how critical thinking is a form of teaching that should be embedded in every aspect of what a student does in class, regardless of subject or grade level. You will understand why critical thinking should not happen in isolation, or in specific subjects, but should permeate all Programs of Study.

Throughout the day, you will deepen your understanding of the attitudes, skills and knowledge students need in order to effectively engage in critical thinking. Basic tools and strategies to support student development of critical thinking will be shared (and experienced!), with the opportunity to tailor the tools to your grade level. The final portion of the day will explore how to gather evidence of student's growth in relation to critical thinking, as well as examine proven formative assessment strategies, including how to build criteria related to critical thinking.
